Every Imperfect and Normal Family wants their kids to turn out right. So, we establish goals for character development and try to create an environment where our kids can mature. Church, school, sports teams, family relationships... each of these provides a context where our kids can learn to "love your neighbor as yourself."

Unfortunately, our "good" objectives might have absolutely nothing to do with the gospel of Jesus Christ. And we inadvertently end up raising pagans instead of Christians.

Too many times, (Christian) parents have it as their goal to make their kids good and moral. It is as if the entire purpose of their family's spiritual life is to shape their children into law-abiding citizens who stay out of trouble. The only problem with this goal is that it runs in stark contrast to what the Bible teaches. The gospel is not about making bad people moral, but about making dead people alive. If we teach morality without the transforming power of the gospel and the necessity of a life fully surrendered to God's will, then we are raising moral pagans.

We end up teaching the wrong thing because we have the wrong objectives.

This sentiment was stirred in me afresh when I read an interview with Veggie Tales creator Phil Vischer. He was reflecting on how the "Christian message" he was trying to teach wasn't Christianity at all...

"I looked back at the previous 10 years and realized I had spent 10 years trying to convince kids to behave Christianly without actually teaching them Christianity. And that was a pretty serious conviction. You can say, "Hey kids, be more forgiving because the Bible says so," or "Hey kids, be more kind because the Bible says so!" But that isn't Christianity, it's morality...

And that was such a huge shift for me from the American Christian ideal. We're drinking a cocktail that's a mix of the Protestant work ethic, the American dream, and the gospel. And we've intertwined them so completely that we can't tell them apart anymore. Our gospel has become a gospel of following your dreams and being good so God will make all your dreams come true. It's the Oprah god."

So what is your objective?

Do you teach your kids "be good because the Bible tells you to" or do you teach your kids that they will never be good without Christ's offer of grace? There is a huge difference. One leads to moralism; the other leads to brokenness. One leads to self-righteousness; the other leads to a life that realizes that Christ is everything and that nothing else matters.

I want my kids to be good. We all do. But as our kids grow up, the truth of the gospel can easily get lost somewhere between salvation (where we know we need Jesus) and living life (where we tend to say "I've got this"). My experience is that the

vast majority of parents are encouraging moral behavior in their kids so that God will bless their (usually selfcentered) pursuits. It's the American Dream plus Jesus. And it produces good, moral pagans.

Consider the key objectives you have for your kids. Seriously, take a minute to think about what would deem you a successful parent. If your goals are focused on your kids' behavior, their happiness, or their accomplishments (but don't include a dependence upon Christ and a submission to His will and work), then you might want to make some adjustments.

Because the world has enough pagans. Even plenty of really nice ones. What we need is kids who fully grasp the reality that they have nothing to offer, but who intimately know a God who has everything they need.

The Probabilty of Jesus **Fullfilling the all Prophecies**

"When we consider the prophetic testimony to Jesus, we do well to heed it. There are at least 332 distinct Old Testament predictions regarding the Messiah that Jesus fulfilled perfectly. The combination of this evidence together, from a simple statistical perspective, is absolutely overwhelming.

Professor Peter Stoner has calculated that the probability of any one man fulfilling eight of these prophecies is one in 100,000,000,000,000,000 (10 to the 17th power). That number of silver dollars would cover the state of Texas two feet deep. Stoner says that if you consider 48 of the prophecies, the odds become one in 10 to the 157th power."

uncan Campbell was in his study early in the morning preparing a message to preach at an upcoming Keswick Convention. At this time in his life he was a Presbyterian pastor. From up in his study he could hear singing in the parlor below. It was his sixteen year old daughter's voice and she was happily singing a hymn. He went downstairs to listen to her. As she finished singing he asked her a question. He said, "Lassie, what is there to sing about so early in the morning at six o'clock?" She came over and sat on his lap and exclaimed, "Oh, Daddy! I have just spent an hour with Jesus. Isn't Jesus wonderful, Daddy?"


Duncan Campbell thought about that remark. He had been upstairs in his study working on a sermon on holiness when he had first heard his daughter singing downstairs. He asked himself this question, "Can I truly say this morning that Jesus is wonderful to me right now?" He answered himself, "No. I cannot honestly say that." This broke his heart. Then he went back into his study and forced himself upon the floor to pray. He prayed all morning until he felt he had met God. Then he came to this realization: for the last several years, even though he was a busy pastor, he had been in a dry wilderness desert as far as his relationship to God was. He had been "Campbell of revival" and a busy pastor but he had lost the joy of an intimate daily walk with God.

Around this time another incident occurred in his life. He met an elder of a church in Scotland who had in his possession a hand written letter by Robert Murray M'Cheyne to Andrew Bonar. The elder allowed Duncan Campbell to read the letter, his eyes fell on these

startling words of Robert Murray M'Cheyne: "Dear Andrew, I seem to know Jesus Christ better than any of my earthly relatives." These words startled Duncan Campbell. Could he say of himself that he knew Jesus like that? The Holy Spirit convicted his heart and showed him how far away he had strayed from God. Then Duncan Campbell made the following remark: "I realized then that no amount of labor in the vineyard will make up for neglect of the King Himself!"

This story of Duncan Campbell should challenge each of us as to why we need to develop a more personal relationship with God. It is too easy to become distracted with work and life and neglect the King!

We must pause here and ask ourselves this question: "Is Jesus wonderful to me today?" Can we honestly say that we have a daily walk with God that is vital, intimate, and wonderful? Is He more real to us today than He was yesterday? Do we even have a time which is set apart for meeting God each day? Does He speak to us? Can you, like Moses, say that you have an encounter with God every day? Or do you have "dry eyes" in your prayer time rather than "wet eyes" from a love relationship."




